Excitement Grows As Renovation Progresses

You know things are going well when the Moms are excited. This was the reaction from many of the Moms, Dads and guests who took a preview tour of the chapter house on Mom's Day weekend. Although a long way from being ready for occupancy, the interior of the house is at a point where you can begin to visualize how the renovated structure will appear. The second and third floor study rooms are close to completion and the new activity space in the basement is coming together nicely. It will have a similar look and feel of the Great Hall and will be the new social area for chapter functions. Most of the bathrooms are now ready for the fixtures. The restoration of the Great Hall, Dining Room and Game Room is also moving along well. Some of the new kitchen equipment is in as work in this area is now underway for this expanded facility.

When walking through and around the construction site one's immediate impression is "this place is big". With the addition of roughly 9,000 sq. ft. of space the new facility will have a lot of space for the undergrads to live, study and socialize.

Managing this project has required a tremendous amount of time from the Building Committee, House Corporation and active chapter members. Bi-weekly construction review meetings are held at the work site, and on a monthly basis, the House Corp and Building Committee members meet in lengthy See Renovation Page 3

Brotherhood Dinner continued . .



The article also highlighted Dave's brilliant college basketball career at Purdue where Dave led the nation in scoring (32.5 pts/gm) as a senior and was first team All American, as well as a three time All-Big Ten and Purdue team MVP. His career scoring average of 28.8 pts. is second only to Rick Mount. Dave was Purdue's first Academic All-American, and he was the first pick of the Chicago Bulls in the 1966 NBA draft. Maj. Gen. Frederic Miller '32 Served Country, Fraternity

Maj Gen Frederic H. Miller, USAF (Ret.), Delta Delta's oldest living Consul having served during the Spring semester of 1932, a Significant Sig and Life Loyal Sig, entered Chapter Eternal on January 26 at the age of 95.

His interment was at Arlington National Cemetery on March 1, 2007 where he took his rightful place of honor among the other distinguished heroes who served our country so well during World War II.

At Purdue, he was obligated to take two years of reserve officer's training. The field artillery unit at Purdue was the largest in the United States with 1700 cadets. He liked the military and signed up for the advance courses staying in the ROTC unit until graduation. Upon graduation from Purdue in 1932 with a bachelor's degree in electrical engineering and a commission as a Second Lieutenant, US Army Reserve in Field Artillery, he volunteered for flight training in the Army Air Corps. He was accepted in the Cadet program and sent to Primary Flying Randolph School Field, at TX, graduated from the Air Corps Advanced Flying School, Kelly Field, TX receiving his wings and commission in October 1933. It was the Great Depression and Fred was fortunate to be selected as a flight instructor, as few jobs were available in or out of the military at that time.

Assigned to the Second Bomb Division in England where he served as commanding officer of the 491st Bomb Group: during combat operations, he flew B24's as a pilot during numerous missions over Germany, adding an oak leaf cluster to his Legion of Merit.

After the war he graduated from Wharton School with a master's degree in business administration and served in various high leadership capacities at the Pentagon and in Europe.

In 1966 he became the Chief Financial Officer and Deputy Director of Administration of the John F. Kennedy Space Center. Soon he became one of the three top directors of the KSC during the Apollo Program years. He retired in July 1975 from his second successful ca-

the Campaign to Secure the Future of Delta Delta. He was keenly interested in the campaign and the construction progress. He was proud to have served as Consul and to be asked to contribute to what he thought was a splendid undertaking.

Brother Miller served his country magnificently in her time of great need. He filled an important position at a very critical time in our history to accomplish the Moon landings mandated by President Kennedy that again brought the country together in a common cause that kept our nation in the forefront of Space and Science.

As we bid him a fond farewell, we know the White Cross has certainly gained new luster by his life.
